# Early Childhood Development

To lead in the 21st century, communities must provide the best educational opportunities possible. The earliest years in a child's life are key to predicting ultimate success in school and in life. The Foundation invests in organizations that:

- Encourage and advocate for policy change to improve programming for children, prenatal through age 5, and their families.
- Support a system to assess, improve, and communicate the quality of child care programs.
- Support the expansion of high quality preschool programs for 3 and 4 year olds.
- Support and encourage the implementation of evidence-based parent education and home visitation programs for parents with young children.
- Increase support for evidence-based teen pregnancy prevention programs.

# Highlighted Grants

Project HOPE leads the way in serving children with autism. Early intervention using Applied Behavior Analysis, an intensive therapy focused on language, behavioral, social, and cognitive skills, can be life changing for children diagnosed with autism. With help from the Foundation, children under age three can access financial resources to continue therapy for an additional three years.

Spartanburg County First Steps is building a foundation for children to succeed through a comprehensive system to assess, improve, and communicate the quality of child care programs. Quality Counts uses nationally recognized indicators to rate programs on a scale of 1 to 5 stars, giving parents a tool to select among child care options. To date, 38 of the centers in Spartanburg County (approximately 40%) participate.

### Middle Tyger Community Center

\$49,000 for the first year of a three-year grant to support the Adolescent Family Life Program, a project to serve pregnant and parenting adolescents and their families in School Districts Two and Five designed to help families become healthy and self sufficient.

\$62,270 for the third year of a three-year grant to support a Family Literacy program designed to further the education of adolescent mothers, delay subsequent pregnancies, promote parent education, and provide high quality childcare and education.

### Northside Child Development Center Fund

\$1,000,000 lead gift to establish a Child Development Center in the

### Northside. Project HOPE Foundation

\$21,073 to provide intensive early intervention services to children with autism.

### **REACH Upstate**

\$40,000 for the third year of a three-year grant to support teen pregnancy prevention efforts.

### SC Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy

\$22,250 to increase awareness and parent-child communication in Spartanburg County.

### SC Department of Social Services

\$50,000 to supportMiddle Tyger Community Center's Adolescent Family Life Program, which serves pregnant and parenting adolescents and their families in School Districts Two and Five. Funding from the Foundation allowed Middle Tyger Community Center to leverage an additional \$45,000 from the Department of Social Services.

\$50,000 to support the Palmetto Project and its Children's Health Initiative. a project to expand Medicaid enrollment and retention of eligible children in Spartanburg County. Funding from the Foundation allowed Palmetto Project to leverage an additional \$45,000 from the Department of Social Services.

\$70,000 to support BirthMatters, a community-based doula program serving young families in Spartanburg County. Funding from the Foundation allowed BirthMatters to leverage an additional \$65,000 from the Department of Social Services.

### Spartanburg County First Steps

\$141,750 for the first year of a three-year grant to support Quality Counts, a quality rating and improvement system for child care programs.

# Spartanburg Academic Movement (formerly College Hub)

\$15,000 to support the Toolkit for Kindergarten Readiness and Early Childhood Screening Initiative.

### United Way of the Piedmont

\$20,000 for the first year of a three-year grant to support Imagination Library, a program that provides free, age-appropriate books to children once a month from birth to age five.



## HEALTHY EATING / ACTIVE LIVING

A healthy and vibrant community provides convenient and affordable access to healthy foods and opportunities for physical activity. The Foundation invests in organizations that:

- Advocate for policy and environmental change to improve opportunities for HE/AL, including safe neighborhoods with parks; complete streets; connected trails and paths; and schools that are accessible and open to the community.
- Support evidence-based PE programs before, during, and after school.
- Advocate for availability and affordability of fresh and healthy foods through community and school-based gardens; farm to school programs and other venues for sale and distribution.
- Support infrastructure including, but not limited to, parks, recreation facilities, trails and bike paths, and farmers' markets.
- Increase awareness and social support for the use of places and programs that encourage HE/AL.

# Highlighted Grants

SPARK PE is a nationally recognized curriculum that gets kids more physically active during PE classes and throughout the rest of the day. Through a partnership with all seven Spartanburg County School Districts, the Foundation provided training to elementary and middle school PE teachers.

#### Spartanburg County School District One,

in partnership with the City of Inman and The Inman Trail Commission, has created a network of sidewalks and walking trails to give residents and visitors a safe pedestrian loop. With funding from the Foundation, the Inman Trail now includes convenient access to a walking trail and a track on the campus of Mabry Middle School.

\$7,580 to support City Dance, a program that provides dance instruction to children in Spartanburg School Districts 6 and 7.

### **Butterfly Foundation**

\$11,250 to support the Healthy Food Hub where it will operate its culinary arts training program and a community cafe.

\$8,250 to educate medical providers, teachers, and others in Spartanburg County about eating disorders, nutrition, and wellness.

\$6.400 to support a planning process for expanded amenities along the Mary Black Foundation Rail Trail.

\$13,225 to purchase two tricycles that will expand the cycling experience to include those with special needs.

\$63,000 for the second year of a two-year grant to support the implementation of its strategic plan, including growing access and opportunities for bicycling.

### Spartanburg County Parks Department

\$50,000 to support the planning and redevelopment of the playground at Cleveland Park.

### Spartanburg County School District One

\$10,000 to support construction of a segment of the Inman Trail.

### **Spartanburg County School District Three**

\$4,242 to support "Tigers On The Move" by incorporating fitness stations into an existing walking track at Clifdale Elementary School.

\$52,986 to expand SPARK PE in Spartanburg County through: (1) training of four local SPARK PE Trainers to sustain implementation within elementary schools and (2) training for approximately 40 middle school PE teachers.

### The Tyger River Foundation

\$2,500 for a plan to develop the Tygerberry Trail.

### YMCA of Greater Spartanburg

\$10,000 to support the Mary Black Foundation Half Marathon.

\$38,725 for the first year of a two-year grant to develop a worksite wellness program.

\$50,000 for the last year of a four-year grant to support the Pine Street Family YMCA Capital Project.

### **Upstate Forever**

\$59,000 for the second year of a two-year grant to promote the adoption and implementation of active living policies in Spartanburg County.



# COMMUNITY HEALTH FUND

The Community Health Fund is a grantmaking resource that allows the Foundation to remain flexible by responding to grant applications outside of the two priority areas but still within the Foundation's mission of improving health and wellness. While a smaller resource for grantmaking, the Community Health Fund is an important tool to address many pressing community health concerns.

Since the Mary Black Foundation begain offering grants through the Community Health Fund in 2003, the Foundation has awarded over \$3,400,000 in grants to support nonprofits' work in improving health and wellness in Spartanburg County. In 2013, the Foundation made grants in excess of \$330,000.

# Highlighted Grants

Adult Learning Center offers classes for GED, ESOL, basic literacy and computer skills. With funding from the Mary Black Foundation, they are partnering with Arcadia Elementary School to provide ESOL and GED classes to parents and community members who live near the school. The classes will help adult learners bridge the language gap, allowing them to provide a more economically stable and healthy home.

Healthy Smiles provides screening, prevention, and treatment to promote better dental care among uninsured and low income children in Spartanburg County. Funding from the Foundation will allow them to purchase a digital x-ray machine for the Free Dental Clinic. Digital x-rays will lead to more efficient diagnosis, treatment, and referral and will help to improve the oral health of children served.

\$5,000 to support vision screenings among the uninsured in Spartanburg County.

\$25,000 to support a one-to-one technology initiative for the students at Cleveland Academy of Leadership.

### **Piedmont Care**

\$11,000 to create a well-designed, user-friendly, and flexible website to reach its many stakeholders.

### SAFE Homes Rape Crisis Coalition

\$35,000 to support outreach and advocacy efforts among Spartanburg's college campuses.

### SC Department of Social Services

\$20,000 to support Palmetto Project in an effort to increase access to medical care and food security for vulnerable children ages 0-19 and their parents. Funding from the Foundation allowed Palmetto Project to leverage an additional \$18,000 from the Department of Social Services.

### Spartanburg Alcohol and Drug Abuse Commission

\$15,700 to support the IMPACT Coalition's goals to increase awareness about underage drinking, prescription drug abuse, and new drug trends.

### Spartanburg Regional Foundation/AccessHealth Spartanburg

\$5,000 to support strategic planning for AccessHealth Spartanburg.

\$7,100 to support better collaboration between AccessHealth and St. Luke's Free Medical Clinic.

### Spartanburg County Behavioral Health Collaborative Fund

\$10,000 to support ongoing efforts among the Joint Funders to address behavioral health in Spartanburg County.

### The Spartanburg Little Theatre

\$10,000 to support Imagine That, a youth improvisational theatre troupe that addresses sensitive social issues.

### The Urban League of the Upstate

\$30,000 to support staff, student incentives, and travel related to career and college exploration.

### University of South Carolina Upstate Foundation

\$15,000 for technology and training needs of the Mary Black School of Nursing.

\$25,000 for the first and second years of a three-year grant to provide program support for Iron Yard, the Spartanburg Accelerator Project.
